Mark Garfinkle and John Peterson gave an update on the Puerto Rico water filter project.

They were able to get the design they had to work in the lab (Tim Eunice's shop). Several modifications had to be made to get it to work, primarily they had to apply a water seal on the inside of the filter. When they built the filter in Puerto Rico, they had a similar problem with the concrete leaking. They were successful in getting the filter to work. The most time consuming part of the project was washing the gravel that went into the filter. For each filter, it takes about 6 hours to wash the gravel.

One of the problems is they could only use FDA approved paint on the inside of the filter since they were producing potable water.

The design has coarse gravel in the base with a finer gravel over it. Above the finer gravel is sand with a bacterial layer above that.

Water enters the top and flows over the bacteria and then through the sand and gravel layers. Pure water comes. They are expensive and time consuming to make.

They have found a simpler and cheaper system that is just as good. The new design has a plastic membrane filter. They are attempting to put 100 units into houses in Puerto Rico this summer. They will then apply for a grant for 1,000 units.
